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Tango, Feathered

The birds created by the Offenburg artists Ingrid und Dieter Werres, which have alighted on the city are some of its most original public beings. One is located in front of the historic town hall, coated in bronze, and lets children play with it. Others sit on walls or on garage roofs, in pairs or alone and gaze up and down the streets. Sometimes with interest and sometimes bored, but always unobtrusive and likable. They are Offenburgers by birth, and just belong there.



As a tribute to the Tango Alemanno - also born in Offenburg - on its 20th birthday, the artists taught their shapely feathered works of art how to tango - with their subtle forms and a choreography that perfectly harmonized with the christening of the small Tango "Petite Fleur".

That no hammers or chisels are allowed in the vicinity of these graceful clay figurines goes without saying. That is why the painter Guy Respaud will carry on the message with a fine quill and a very soft brush: It always takes two to tango.

According to the leading German encyclopedia "Meyers", the tango is a dance that originated in Argentina, with a 2/4 or 4/8 tact, in syncopated rhythm, with crossed steps and an abrupt halt. The Tango-Aleman originated in Offenburg, is a temperature control unit and reaches the set point the fastest, within a blink of the eye. That is why the Tango is named Tango.




Fig. 4: The basic steps for men in the M1 course (Man 1 or preliminary semester). Notice the set point at number 8.

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
